The Church Never Closed FCC Stow Elders and Pastor

It's been 10 weeks since we began online worship via Facebook Live and YouTube. 10 weeks. And truthfully, it might be another ten weeks of online worship. It may even be more. All of us hope and pray it will be less, but we also have to be prepared for it being longer. We the Elders and Pastor meet twice a month to continue conversations around this matter and all of its logistics.

Nevertheless, whether we are meeting in person for worship, or meet online, one truth remains... *the Church has never been closed*.

For the past ten weeks we have very been much open, tending to the essentials of being church: offering the chance to draw closer to the divine through worship, feeding the hungry, supporting our community, praying for and assisting those in our midst who are ill, providing ways to give back to God a portion of what God has given us, and being a church family no matter the distance between us. And all of you have responded faithfully.

Still there has been a lot of talk, and angst, and debate, and anger, and vitriol shared and spread and spewed about "shutting down" "being shut-down" "opening up" "restarting" "essential" "nonessential" and all the other buzz words and terms that have been used. As we have all seen, it has been ugly, and much of it has been politicized by both sides of the isle, and even in the courts. Without question, the Church has been used as a pawn in these political and partisan games that are being played out in the media and across social media platforms. But First Christian Church of Stow will not allow ourselves to get drawn into such games. It is our aim and focus to be the church God is calling us to be, no matter what that means.

We are continuing to suspend in-person worship to keep people safe—and not just our congregation. We are doing it to keep everyone safe because when the church comes together to do what we do—greet, hug, sing, and so forth—there is a level of interaction that is deemed high risk, which makes for a broader possibility that those who go to church could later spread the virus when going out for groceries, medical appointments, and the like. However, we feel there is the opportunity to still be a church that can safely come together in ways that are low-risk for those who chose to come. For example, after a one month hiatus, Loaves and Fishes came back with a revamped method that saw its normal output nearly tripled. Additionally, there is a consensus that an outdoor social gathering of church folk could be managed with low risk, but still with a lot of fun. (See below for information about how this is going to be done.)

We have suspended in-person worship gatherings because it is the right, faithful, and safe thing to do, but we are <u>not</u> closed. We have never been closed, nor will we ever close. The Church has been, is, and will always be essential because God is still calling it to fulfill its ministry. And with God's help we are going to figure out just how we can get the job done.

Church Family Fun Night Sunday, June 14th 7-8p.m.

It is summer time during a global pandemic which means we need to follow a set of guidelines to help slow the spread of the coronavirus. A recent NPR article broke down activities and the risks associated with, and cited that small outdoor gatherings where folks brought their own chairs and food and wore masks and remained socially distant that the risk of spreading the virus would be low.

So, with that understanding, if you are so inclined you are invited to a Church Family Fun Night on Sunday, June 14th from 7p.m. to 8 p.m. in the newly refinished church parking lot. More details on the logistics of the evening will be shared as they come together, but we can say now that we will keep folks socially distanced from one another (families will of course be together), masks will be highly encouraged, and we will gather for just one hour so as to cut down on the need for bathroom uses (although restroom access will be available.) Please also plan to bring your own snacks and beverages as none will be provided.

This is intended to be a simple gathering, with some fun socially distant friendly games. Come to join in the games, or come to just see and say hello to folks from your church family!



It's no surprise the phrase and hashtag, #2020IsWeird has gone viral. Admittedly there have been many other superlatives used to describe 2020 beyond it just being weird, but this is a church and family publication so I'll just leave it as "weird"

and let you decide whether or not you want to Google descriptors of 2020. I suspect your imagination will suffice though. But among them all, 2020 is indeed weird. It's not what any of us expected for the famed "2020 Vision" that the start of this optometrist play on words and image was so perfectly set up to be.

None of us could foresee a global pandemic that would fast-track online worship and no in-person gatherings. None of us could imagine a summer without graduation ceremonies and parties, our ice cream social, our 4th of July Pancake Breakfast, a night with the Akron Rubber Ducks, and an online take-home Vacation Bible School. Throw in murder hornets and the 17 year return of the cicadas and preachers start getting email requests for more sermons from the book of Revelation.

So, yeah. 2020 is weird. And now it's summer time—the best time of the year if you ask me—but we are required to stay socially distant from one another and wear masks when we do go out in order to help slow the spread of COVID-19. Which is exceedingly hard, not just because it has been months since we've started having to do it, but more so because God created us to live in community. We are meant to be around others, which means social isolation will inevitably take a toll on our psychological health. So what are we to do?

First, and foremost, it is critically important we take seriously the recommended procedures to prevent health care systems from getting overloaded which can ultimately lead to more deaths. This means of course to stay home as much as possible, do social distancing, wear a mask when you do go out, and follow all the guidelines we have been hearing about for the past two and a half months.

After that, we do need to tend to our physical and psychological health and well-being because as I mentioned above, this staying at home, as great as being home can be, has its downside. Samantha Tidball, pastor in Nashville, Tennessee calls this time "The Great Pause." As a result, people are spending more time at home and some have more time on their hands than they know what to do with.

Tidball address the issues surrounding "the great pause" and writes in her blog saying, "During this time of quarantine, it's as if someone hit the pause button for most of society. The days are blending together and boredom is hitting some people harder than others. Since we have not collectively experienced anything like this pandemic in our

lifetime, it's easy to feel anxious from the unknowns and worries over loss of life, jobs and normalcy. It's also not unusual to experience boredom. Still, boredom isn't necessarily a bad feeling. Many psychologists claim boredom is necessary for our brains to generate creative solutions to problems or serve as an artistic outlet for our anxiety. On one hand, boredom can cause trouble when we feel tempted to become apathetic or complacent. But on the other, boredom can lead to incredible ingenuity or creative expressions of our humanity that bring glory to God. For example, Isaac Newton came up with his greatest discoveries after being sent home from Cambridge University in order to stay safe during the bubonic plague. The year he spent at home was known as his 'year of wonders' during which he discovered important theories about gravity, optics and calculus."

Now I assure you, the closest I will get to calculus is typing the word just now. But this time of wonder can be whatever we chose. So what if instead of #2020IsWeird. it was more like #2020IsFullOfWonder? Or maybe, #2020PauseFeedsMySpirit? Or maybe #2020IsFullOfDiscovery? We don't need to discover important ground breaking theories about the cosmos or invent now forms of mathematics, nor do we need to write the great American Novel. (Although Violet and I are working on what will no doubt be a best seller children's book about a goose on a roof, inspired by an actual goose on the roof of one of our church Elders.)

So let's be intentional to make room for some self-care, or maybe some Lenten-like introspection where we step before God in intentional ways. Perhaps we can learn to love others better during this time, be a better neighbor, or start a new hobby. Or maybe we start a new spiritual practice—perhaps where we write down things we are grateful for, then choose one to pray about and give thanks for.

Whatever we do during this unique time, it can be an opportunity to explore the good things God is doing even in the midst of a time when it's hard to see much good happening. May such choices help us all have a great summer.

Update from the Stewardship Team Financial Giving From the Congregation

The Congregational Giving budget amount is \$22,384 per month. For May (so far) we are under that amount by approximately \$5,000, we have received \$17,306. We are not surprised by this dip, even though April was a very good month. We are all dealing with much uncertainty!

Since we will not be having an organized work day we found it easier to split the mowing and trimming jobs and do them independently based on our schedule and weather.

Please look over the following list to see if there is something you would be willing to help out with.

<u>Mowing:</u> Front yard, Piano house to fire pit, Williamson Rd. To fire pit, south of building inside white fence, east side by gym.

<u>String trimming:</u> Both sides of white fence, hill along north side of driveway, ditch and around stumps Williamson Rd., around piano house and garage.

Outside cleanup and maintenance: Plant flowerbed NE corner of sanctuary * Trim bushes high boxes by front door ramp * Weed and trim bushes south side of nursery * Weed and trim bushes by Jr. church room (lower doors) * Level drain pipe in garden by Jr. church room * Weed and trim front gardens * Remove stump to below ground level front yard by white fence * Cut and stack large limbs that are on the ground by fire pit (chainsaw needed)

<u>Outside Painting Doors:</u> SW sanctuary, elevator, NW sanctuary, NE sanctuary, Metal beams and posts over ramp by front door.

At this time we don't feel we can call on a full workday. Most of these are items that can be completed individually. If you feel comfortable working with another person or small group that is your choice.

The church does have a lawn tractor, push mower, battery string trimmer and limited yard tools. We also have painting supplies. Other than that we have been providing our own tools.
