calming impact goes deeper as we all long for the day when we can be out about without the specter of a virus looming over us. It has been, and it continues to be, my prayer that even in the midst of the pandemic-stress brought on by this global health crisis, that you are able to grasp hold of the peace that passes all understanding, that we are in the care of the Shepherd who is always at work to restore our souls.

Still though, I get it. This is still really, really hard, which is why this entire Psalm becomes so incredibly important.

Even though I walk through the darkest valley, I fear no evil; for you are with me; Your rod and your staff-they comfort me.

We are deep within a dimly lit valley, and though we know we have the comfort of God's almighty rod and staff to give us the protection and comfort we want and need, we are still yearning for the valley to end and the green pastures and still waters to be restored.

You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies;

Yet the Psalmist reminds us that even in the midst of our enemies—in this case a global pandemic—we are able to live abundant life with God. It's hard to see this, but our faith leads us to this truth even when we can't see. The danger that lurks though, when we cannot see, is that we begin to think we are on our own and we have to find our own path out of the valley. Which is where I worry many are starting to find themselves.

What I have been fearful of happening seems to be starting. We are not an idle people. As one friend recently shared with me, "I was made to be in motion." This is such a true statement for many of us, and this shelter in place, stay-at-home order has been hard because we are made to be in motion, we are designed to be in community with others, to see, and touch and simply be together. Add in we know there

are economic ramifications that are starting to really show their impact right here in our own community. We simply are ready for this to all be over, and some of us are deciding on our own it's over and it's time for life as we know it to resume. And I get it. But what always happens when we leave God's path for our own path? Where do we always end up? Lost. Vulnerable. Alone. Like a sheep without a shepherd.

You anoint my head with oil;
my cup overflows.
Surely goodness and mercy

the Lord
my whole life long.

This global health crisis is not God's will for the world. God's will is always about us being found, being safe, being in God's everlasting care where the blessings of God overflow our cups. It is why God sent to us Jesus, to be the shepherd we need, the shepherd who will lead us through the dim valleys of life into those green pastures and beside those still waters where we are able to see and embrace the blessings that make our cups overflow. This day is surely coming. I cannot say when or even if it will be sooner than later. But I do know it is coming.

So as we traverse this dim valley, let us stay close to our good shepherd who will lead us through. Let us be fully aware of the enemy in our midst, and act and live accordingly, know that we can have a role in extending the comfort of God's almighty rod and staff to others by doing what we can to keep one another safe, healthy and well.

For when we do such, then we help God in leading all of God's children to green pastures and still waters where souls are restored.

And this is his commandment, that we should believe in the name of his Son Jesus Christ and love one another, just as he has commanded us. All who obey his commandments abide in him, and he abides in them.

Update on Summer Camps and Conferences at Camp Christian Regional Office, Christian Church in Ohio

For 70 years the summers at Camp Christian have been the highlight of the year for so many people. It's abundantly clear from all of the messages of prayers and support we received over the last few weeks, as well as the number of RSVPs for our modified summer programming that Camp still holds an important place in the hearts and minds of the people of Ohio. The love and passion that so many show for Camp Christian is a great blessing. This has been, and continues to be an amazing and beloved community.

This is an update that we had hoped to never have to write. It is with broken hearts that we share with you the decision to not open Camp Christian for the 2020 summer season.

For the past month, the Regional Staff, Camp Christian Committee, Regional Treasurer and Regional Moderator have been in prayer and discernment. We have all been meeting regularly to discuss and plan for the possibilities of camp this summer. In monitoring the ongoing COVID-19 epidemic and following the latest health and safety information from the Governor's recommendations, we have determined that it simply will not be possible for us to safely or effectively open Camp Christian this summer.

A number of factors went into this decision, including the logistics of being able to purchase enough food, keeping camp clean, being able to have access to cleaning, safety, and medical supplies (so many of which are now being rightly prioritized by hospitals and medical centers), and enforcing safe social distancing practices for the youth and young people who would attend our summer programs. Above all, the health and safety of our campers has been our focus and our mission and with that in mind, we have decided to close Camp Christian for summer 2020.

To be clear, it is still the intention of the Ohio Region to have Camp next summer. This is not a permanent closure of Camp Christian. Although we will still need to do some fundraising and we may still need to adjust some of our logistics and health protocols between now and then, we will be working diligently this entire year to provide the safest and best camp season in 2021.

We are deeply saddened and grieving this loss. We know that many of us have been praying for a different outcome. We know that many of us have already suffered so many losses in the past couple of months, and to lose time at Camp too can feel unbearable to some. Please know that although we feel this is the right and responsible path forward, that does not mean that it is not a difficult and disheartening path forward as well.

In the coming weeks, the Directors and Officers of our various camps and conferences will meet virtually to begin

discussions on alternative programming options we will be able to offer in the coming months. By the end of May, we will share with the Region what programming will be provided so that we may still find ways to fellowship together this summer. We cannot replace the green chair circles, the warm glow of the torch, or the ringing of the bell, but the Holy Spirit is still moving in Ohio and the billions of stars that we see in the night sky at Camp Christian are still shining.

We know that it has been difficult for many of us to hold on to hope in this strange season of our lives. Many of us are mourning now, and that is okay. Our God is with us in our grief. And when we are ready, God will move with us in hope and new possibility, finding ways forward through this camping season and the next. Ultimately, our God is a God of hope.

Our God of hope helped us receive over 450 RSVPs for our modified camp program when we set a goal of 400. Our God of hope helps us to imagine alternative programming opportunities that would have been impossible even 10 years ago. Our God of hope helps us to work together with Directors, Officers, Faculty, ADs, Counselors, and Staff to be able to connect with young people in contemporary and creative ways. Our God of hope helps us to know in our hearts that the mission of Building Beloved Community can never be cancelled or delayed, but springs forth like water from a rock in what feels like a desert season in our lives.

We are eternally grateful for your prayers and your passion for Camp Christian. Together we will move forward in healthy and faithful ways so that generations of people will continue to come to know the love of God through Christ at Camp.

Parking Lot Project May14-15, 2020

You'll recall a parking lot resurfacing project was presented to, and approved by the congregation in January, before the COVID-19 health crisis broke. After that approval the church signed a contract agreement with Cardinal Paving, a local small business, to have our parking lot resurfaced this spring. Prior to this vote, the Stewardship Team identified the means in which this project could be fully supported through already existing church funds. After lengthy discussion about this project in light of the COVID-19 health crisis, the Stewardship Team, with input and support from the Elders, made the decision to proceed with this important project. Factors that helped influence this decision included that the funds earmarked for use are from restricted accounts designated for projects such as this, and that we would be supporting a local small business working hard to stay open and pay their employees, that it would be good and faithful and right to proceed with the parking lot project as planned.

We are excited to share that the parking lot will be resurfaced over the course of two days, on Thursday and Friday, May 14 - 15. Access to the parking lot and church will be greatly diminished, which can be considered a blessing since this is a perfect time for this inconvenience. And it will be a great blessing to Cardinal Pavement, its owners and employees.

Stewardship Team Update – Financial Giving from the Congregation

As I write this there are still a few more days of April and this is one of the sunny days! We won't close the financial books for April for another week but I wanted to provide a status of where we are currently with our congregational giving.

The Congregational Giving budget amount is \$22,384 per month. For April we have surpassed that, we have received \$23,772. This is great news! For the first 3 months our giving was below the budgeted amount, so the year to date totals still show the giving below the budget but the generosity shown in April has reduced that deficit. Here is the information:

Abide with Me" is one of the bestloved English hymns of the past 150 years. We see this both in its enduring usage in churches today and in its ongoing appearances in

modern culture (for example, in the <u>opening ceremony</u> of the 2012 Summer Olympics).

What about the hymn has made it so well loved? The words, of course, have a lot to do with it. Each verse ends in the plea "abide with me," making the hymn a sustained call for God's personal presence in every stage and condition of life. The hymn resonates deeply with the hearts of those who feel their need of God.

The author of the hymn, Henry Francis Lyte, was an Anglican priest and vicar of All Saints Church in Brixham, England. He was also a published poet and accomplished hymnwriter who also penned "Jesus, I My Cross Have Taken" and "Praise, My Soul, the King of Heaven.". For most of his life Lyte suffered from poor health, and he would regularly travel abroad for relief, as was the tradition in that day. Nevertheless, he developed tuberculosis and, at the age of 54, came near to the end of his life. His daughter, Anna Maria Maxwell Hogg, recounts the story of how "Abide with Me" came out of that context.

"The summer was passing away, and the month of September (that month in which he was once more to guit his native land) arrived, and each day seemed to have a special value as being one day nearer his departure. His family were surprised and almost alarmed at his announcing his intention of preaching once more to his people. His weakness and the possible danger attending the effort, were urged to prevent it, but in vain. "It was better", as he used to say often playfully, when in comparative health, "to wear out than to rust out". He felt that he should be enabled to fulfil his wish, and feared not for the result. His expectation was well founded. He did preach, and amid the breathless attention of his hearers, gave them a sermon on the Holy Communion. . . . In the evening of the same day he placed in the hands of a near and dear relative the little hymn, 'Abide with Me', with an air of his own composing, adapted to the words." (A Dictionary of Hymnology, Vol. 1)

Just weeks later, while on holiday in Nice, France, Henry Lyte went to be with Jesus. It was November 20th, 1847.

Not many hymns have dramatic stories behind them. This one is not all that dramatic; but knowing that it was written by a man who was very near death at a relatively young age helps us feel its weight and sobriety all the more.

Abide with me; fast falls the eventide; The darkness deepens; Lord with me abide. When other helpers fail and comforts flee, Help of the helpless, O abide with me.

I need Thy presence every passing hour. What but Thy grace can foil the tempter's power?

Who, like Thyself, my guide and stay can be?

Through cloud and sunshine, Lord, abide with me.

I fear no foe, with Thee at hand to bless; Ills have no weight, and tears no bitterness. Where is death's sting? Where, grave, thy victory?

I triumph still, if Thou abide with me.
