I grew up with Mr. Rogers—via public television that is, just like many of you. But I had a friend who quite literally grew up with Mr. Rogers. No joke. Literally. Her dad was a Presbyterian minister in the

greater Pittsburgh area, and you will recall that Fred Rogers was a Presbyterian minister as well. So my friend's dad knew Mr. Rogers, and they were actually very close friends who got together regularly. And because of their friendship Mr. Rogers literally came to her neighborhood, her house, her dining room and had dinner with her and her family. On a regular basis! Can you imagine Mr. Rogers sitting at your dinner table eating your mom's meatloaf? (My mom made amazing meatloaf so that's the dish I always go with.)

I thought of all this, again, because it's what I do when I consider my friend literally being Mr. Rogers' friend. But I also thought of all this when the other day I saw the above quote from Fred Rogers. This quote resonated with me because of the truth it speaks. So few of us do rarely have time for all we want in this life, and as a result we do have to make choices of what we will do. Yes, we have to do things we have to do, and they may not always be what we want to do, but hopefully there are times when we can choose what we want to do. And they really should be choices that come from a deep sense of who we are, and core values we live from.

But that begs the question...Who are we?
We see this question unfold all throughout the
Bible, most especially in the Gospels. One of the most
poignant "who am I" stories that stands out to me is the
story of Nicodemus who was a Pharisee, which means
that while he was a person of faith, he was also (and
probably mostly) a politician. But then Jesus and his
teaching began to challenge and change Nicodemus's
mind, heart, and spirit. The Kingdom of God became
for Nicodemus what it was supposed to be—a life
altering encounter—literally. In the dead of night. With
Jesus right there. Literally.

This was still incredibly hard for Nicodemus because it put him squarely between a rock and a hard place. How could he be who he was, but still be who he was called to be by God? Well, he did it, by working at it each and every day after having that encounter with Jesus.

Nicodemus went to Jesus in the middle of the night and had a life altering conversation, but he never left his life's work as a Pharisee and a member of the Sanhedrin—the high ranking court/tribunal of Elders who served as a legislative and governing body in Jerusalem. He stayed who he was, doing the work he was doing, living around the people he was living with, but he was still changed. Different. Transformed. For the better. Because he had a life altering encounter with Jesus.

I love the story of Nicodemus because in so many ways he is each of us. We are who we are to those around us, but then we have an experience that changes us and its change that can so often be hard to present to others. Will others see us as weak, and giving in? Will others still accept us for having a change of mind, heart, spirit? Will we still be accepted?

I wish I could tell you the answer to all those questions would be that everything will be fine. But I can't. The reality is some people in our lives will react poorly to changes of mind, heart, and spirit. I can tell you, though, that when you live from the deep sense and awareness of who you are—a holy and beloved child of God who strives to live and walk in the ways of Christ—that life will be fine and good even in spite of the struggles and disappointment and sorrow.

Nicodemus kept living his life, but he did so from a deep sense of who he was. And we see this play out just before Jesus' crucifixion when he saw the how the Sanhedrin—the body he was fully entrenched within—was skirting their own rules and law. He knew it was wrong and unjust, and he said so, making happen the importantly critical and powerful trial Jesus went through.

Nicodemus made a choice. And it came from a deep sense of who he was, which came from his experience with Jesus. May we too, always strive to make choices from the deep sense of who we are.

"Anxious To Talk About It" A book study starting September 3rd 7 p.m. via Zoom

Diversity, Equity, Inclusivity Committee

Stow-Munroe Falls Schools and Communities

recently formed the *Diversity, Equity, Inclusivity, Committee* which is intended to be a
school/community initiative that will actively address
the issue of racism, its root causes, and its presence
in our schools and communities. This committee is
made up of area school teachers, faculty, staff and
Board of Education members; along with city
mayors, police officers, and local clergy, which
includes our Pastor, Jonathan.

The vision of the Diversity Equity Inclusivity committee (DEI) of the Stow-Munroe Falls City School District will intentionally promote equitable opportunities for students and staff through its school/community partnership, thus increasing student achievement and enhancing social and emotional learning. We will create a new climate where equity, diversity and inclusion drive our decision making and policy guidelines. We will model integrity and transparency while creating a sustainable culture that values and understands that diversity, equity and inclusion are essential to creating a safe, supportive and empowering school environment for all students and staff. We will accomplish this by:

- 1. Celebrating diversity and the differences that exist in our community.
- 2. Intentionally build relationships with students and families.
- Creating pathways to growth and understanding through the use of curriculum, classroom instruction and professional development for all stakeholders in the district.
- Generating an equitable environment at every grade level, we will hold staff and students accountable for bringing needed changes to our district.

Currently, the DEI committee is reviewing curriculum, instruction, student experience, climate/culture, the Stow-Munroe Falls community culture, professional development, and policy and hiring practices. After the review of these eight areas the committee with create an action plan.

Please keep this committee in your prayers as they do this important work of making our community even more diverse, equitable, and inclusive.

Christian Church in Ohio Renewal Initiative Summer and Fall 2020

The Christian Church in Ohio and Camp Christian had to make the tough but necessary decision to not hold in-person Summer Camp, as well as postponing all Regional events for the Spring, Summer, and now into the Fall. It is clear that these sad but needed decisions have left a void in the lives of many people, especially those who were eager to spend time at Camp this summer. This situation has also caused a real, tangible financial hardship for the Region and Camp Christian. Registration fees and donations made in conjunction with those events help pay for our staff, operations, buildings and grounds, and general upkeep of the Camp.

To that end, we are now launching a Renewal Initiative which will help raise funds not just to offset financial losses from the impact of the coronavirus, but to sustain the mission of the Ohio Region and Camp Christian in the future. By the end of this year, we hope to be able to call a new Regional Minister who will help to focus our vision and leadership. In 2021 we aim to embark in creative new ministry pathways, and as a part of that, we want to create long-term planning and funding for Camp Christian so that we can ensure the longevity of this faithful ministry of the Christian Church in Ohio.

Our initial financial goal is to raise \$75,000 so that we can:

- Extend an offer to a Regional Minister at the end of 2020
- Fully open Camp Christian for the Summer of 2021
- Explore new Ministry Opportunities through the findings of the Regional Transition Team
- Jump-start a renewed purpose, strengthen relationships and support local ministries and leaders
- In 2021 we aim to embark in creative new ministry pathways, and as a part of that, we want to create long-term planning and funding for the Region and Camp Christian so that we can ensure the longevity of this faithful ministry of the Christian Church in Ohio.

Through the years, the ministries of the Christian Church in Ohio and Camp Christian have thrived because of the continued generosity and active participation from people like you.
