If you didn't get a chance to hear our read my sermon from September 27<sup>th</sup>, "The Time Has Come-The Time Is Now" you might want to click over to the sermons tab on the church website and give it a once over as this pastor's

pen is setting up to be a sort of "part 2" to that sermon. And the reason for that is because I would rather over emphasize than under emphasize that the time has come, and the time is now, for Christians, for followers of Christ to be what we say we believe.

In that sermon I shared the following from retired Episcopal bishop and academic, Rev. Stephan Charleston who wrote recently, saying,

Now is the moment for which a lifetime of faith has prepared you. All of those years of prayer and study, all of the worship services, all of the time devoted to community faith: it all comes down to this, this sorrowful moment when life seems chaotic and the anarchy of fear haunts the thin borders of reason. Your faith has prepared you for this. It has given you the tools you need to respond: to proclaim justice while standing for peace.

Long ago the spirit called you to commit your life to faith. Now you know why. You are a source of strength for those who have lost hope. You are a voice of calm in the midst of chaos. You are a steady light in the days of darkness. The time has come to be what you believe.

These words and their message remind us that our spiritual journey has not been solely for us. It has been for others as well. It has been so that we would grow in our spirituality and deepen our relationship with God and Jesus, experience the transformation that comes with doing so, be blessed to be a blessing, and then to share that transformation and those blessings with others by showing others, through love and compassion, kindness and civility, that we are who we say we are—the body of Christ Jesus in the world today. This is being *what* we believe.

Now some might feel, and some might say (and they have) that I am teetering on getting political. But this is not about politics. This is not about your political party. This is not about who you plan to vote for in a few weeks. This is about how you will respond to those who are not part of your political party. This about how you will treat those who don't vote for who you plan to vote for in a few weeks.

This is about how you will look at, and think about, those who are different from you. Because here is the thing we all have to realize and accept when we call ourselves Christians, when we proclaim to be followers of Christ... all the labels we give to others—none of them matter. The only label that matters is that all people are children of God. Whether they know it or not, it's the only label that matters. Whether they believe it or not, it's the only label that matters. That is what Jesus taught us to believe. And the time has come for us to be what we believe.

The time has come...the time is now...the time for us to be what we believe. The time has come for us to rise up and know that the divisiveness can be overcome by loving our neighbors as ourselves. The time has come for us to respond to the angry shouts of others with grace and peace. The time has come for us to offer a listening ear to those who are crying out but are not being heard. The time has come for us to speak truth to lies and show civility in the face of incivility. The time has come for us to embrace all people as brothers and sisters in Christ.

The time has come for followers of Christ to be the salt of the earth. The time is now for the church to let the light of Christ shine bright. The time has come; the time is now, for us to be what we believe. With God's help, may it be so.

### World Communion Sunday October 4<sup>th</sup>, 2020

The first Sunday of October is a time when Christians in every culture around the world break bread and pour the cup to remember and affirm Christ as the Head of the Church. It is called World Communion Sunday and it offers a distinctive opportunity to experience Holy Communion in the context of the global community of faith. On World Communion Sunday we remember how we are part of the whole body of believers, all while we celebrate the communion liturgy in as many ways as there are congregations. And though there is diversity in how we all come to the table of remembrance, we know all still partake of the bread of life and the cup of salvation—the gifts of God for the children of God.

World Communion Sunday is a profound worship experience and a time for learning more about our wider community of faith that spans not just Stow, not just Ohio, not just the United States. It spans the entire world. We are all God's children, and we are all invited to our Lord's Table.

# World Communion Sunday Outdoor Communion Services October 4th, 9:30 a.m. and 11:15 a.m.

On Sunday, October 4<sup>th</sup>, we will celebrate World Communion Sunday during our regular 10 a.m. time of worship live streamed on Facebook, but we will also recognize and celebrate this day with an opportunity for in-person, outdoor, socially distanced time of communion.

We will have a time of prayer, song, and communion at 9:30, and then again at 11:15 or so—and each service will last about 15 minutes. Bring with you a chair and mask. We will share communion with individual communion sets that will be provided, or you are welcome to bring your own elements if you wish.

### **Diversity, Equity, Inclusivity Committee**

Stow-Munroe Falls Schools and Communities
The Stow Munroe Falls School District, along with
the Cities of Stow and Munroe Falls has recently formed
the *Diversity, Equity, Inclusivity, Committee* which is
intended to be a school/community initiative that will
actively address the issue of racism, its root causes, and
its presence in our schools and communities. This
committee is made up of area school teachers, faculty,
staff and Board of Education members; along with city
mayors, police officers, and local clergy, which includes
our Pastor, Jonathan.

The mission of the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusivity Committee is to embrace diversity while providing a sustained commitment to equity and inclusion. We will demonstrate this by building meaningful relationships with everyone in our Bulldog Community.

Jonathan is serving on the Community focused subcommittee that includes other area clergy, a school board member, SMFS teachers and administrators, the mayor of Stow, a University of Akron professor, and the chiefs of police for both Stow and Munroe Falls.

Among their brainstorming ideas for community connection and involvement included: Seeking to hold community events that are intentional to meet and greet Stow community leaders and police officers, build relationships and get to know these servant leaders. The question was asked: Does Stow have any black owned businesses that we can feature and celebrate? It was emphasized that people of all color need to be included in places of power: group, committees, boards.

The Community Subcommittee will continue to create an action plan to be submitted to the D.E.I. General Assembly for further public conversations about racism. Among that action plan is creating a presentation for city councils of Stow and Munroe Falls, and present it at both city council meetings. Also, the committee is seeking to create opportunities for community education around black history and broadening understanding, while dispelling myths, around Black Lives Matter/Blue Lives Matter/All Lives Matter.

More updates about the work of this committee will follow in the weeks to come. If you have any questions about the committee or just want to know more please reach out to Jonathan.

# Update from the Stewardship Team Financial Giving From the Congregation

We won't close the financial books for September for a couple more days but I wanted to provide a status of where we are currently with our congregational giving.

The Congregational Giving budget amount is \$22,384 per month. For the month of September (through 9/27) we have received \$20,576. This is below the monthly budget amount by \$1,808. Year to date (through 9/27) we have received \$181,898. This is below the budget amount Year to date by \$18,558.

Our expenses are also lower than budgeted right now, with the limited building use. However, if you personally are feeling financially stable and would like to make an additional gift to the church above your normal giving, those are always appreciated. Any increases will help position us to be able to increase the outreach assistance we can provide to our community, both local and globally.

### When Can We Return to Church?

We are all asking the same question... When can we return to church?

<u>Short answer:</u> When Summit County has four consecutive weeks in a Yellow Status per the Ohio Public Health Advisory System.

<u>Long answer:</u> This plan was conceived by the Elders after intense discussion and prayer over several meetings. The return happens in stages beginning with a limited number of attendees who do not participate in the service.

The Governing Board approved this plan, and we published the entire detailed plan in the August Pathways. (Please contact the church office if you would like a copy.)

The Ohio Public Health Advisory System is updated every Thursday afternoon. The Elders review that update and determine the earliest Sunday we will meet the benchmark for the first stage of return. As of this writing (9/25/20) Summit County is in the Orange Status and the earliest possible Stage 1 return date is Sunday 11/1/20.

The projected return date is subject to change every Thursday when the most recent figures are put up on the coronavirus.ohio.gov website.

So what can we do to help? Several things...

When the time comes (and it will come!) we will need a cleaning crew to clean and sanitize the restrooms and high touch common surfaces such as doors and pews before every service. There will be a sign-up sheet for this activity.

There will be an online sign-up sheet for those who wish to return in Stage 1. This is to ensure that we are able to maintain social distance within the Sanctuary. We will leave room for walk ups because we never want to turn someone away from church.

Everyone who attends will have to wear a mask while in the church building and maintain social distance, and anyone who is experiencing symptoms associated with Covid-19, with or without test results, should stay at home.

And lastly, but really the first and best thing we all can do, is keep praying for God's blessings to be poured out upon those who are working so hard to bring this global health crisis to an end. Let us pray, let us follow the recommendations, and let us all do our part so we can all be back together in church as soon as possible.

Even though Bulldog Bags were not distributed in August due to the delay in the start of school, the cups of mac n cheese were included in the first September Bag. Bulldog Bags, Inc. is working with the SMFCSD's Hybrid schedule for the students' learning, so Bags will be distributed when the students are present in school or when the Bags are picked up for the students on the Gold schedule. Whenever they get them, they will help to stretch the families' food budgets! Although we do not have a number of students yet that we can count on to serve for each distribution, we expect that it will be appreciably higher than were served in 2019-2020.

Bulldog Bags, Inc. thanks you for your support of our summer program, Bulldog Boxes. We have appreciated your allowing the program to be operated out of your church. What you did for the program for summer of 2020 was beyond what could have dreamed of — to have a dedicated room in which to store the food and to allow us to purchase a freezer coincided with the pandemic, when the need for the program doubled in size! It provided a total of 363 Bulldog Boxes over the four packings between June and the end of August! The Boxes contained fresh and frozen foods, as well as non-perishables and taxable items. They weighed an average of 57# each and had an average retail value of \$130.00! Feedback from families through an end-of-program survey was that the Boxes were very helpful in meeting their summer food needs!

The success of Bulldog Bags, Inc. has been our volunteers who are in many capacities: some in person, some through monetary donations, some through food and in-kind donations, some through kind words and cheering the organization on, and some in ways of which we are unaware!
