Pastor's Pen, June 2021

Though it is probably the least celebrated Christian holiday and holy day (ok, it is absolutely the least celebrated Christian

holiday and holy day) Pentecost still holds a special place in my heart. Yes, it's challenging to celebrate the entity of our faith that is impossible to visualize because the Holy Spirit is hard to "see" let alone put into words. (See my May 23rd Pentecost sermon on the church website for more about all this!) Still we celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit, coming as "tongues of fire" and the "sound of a rushing wind" which always seems cool to me. Add in, it's the birthday of the Church so sometimes there's cake! Not to mention, Pentecost can make for some fun and unique Children's Sermon fodder—which means sometimes there's cake! And I love the idea of throngs of people all gathered together in Jerusalem, "Jews from every nation" as the text tells us, further telling how not everyone spoke the same language, but then suddenly that wind and those tongues of fire came and engulfed the people, and with it all came the ability for everyone to hear and understand in their own language the Good News of Jesus Christ being shared. And because of it all, lives were forever changed for the better.

Those are just a few of my favorite things about Pentecost. But then there is this from the story in the second chapter of Acts, verse 17, quoting the prophet Joel, who says... "In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men [and women] shall see visions, and your old men [and women] shall dream dreams." Dream dreams... dreaming dreams... those words... that idea... the act of... it all resonates with me in ways difficult to put into words. Kind of like the Holy Spirit.

These words resonate with me because the prophet Joel is telling us of a day, a time, a place, a way we don't yet have, but one day will be. The only place such exists now is in our dreams—so let us dream these dreams—but let us also know, through our faith, that these dreams

will come true because God is going to make these dreams come true.

If you are like me, you have been dreaming dreams of better days, easier days, days that are no longer so chaotic, busy, hard, heartbreaking, divided, and discouraging. If you're like me, you have been dreaming dreams of days when we are all able to safely be back together on Sunday morning for worship. If you are like me, you have been dreaming dreams of warmer weather, gathering with friends and family; going to...oh I don't know...places! If you are like me, you have been dreaming dreams of peace on earth. good will to all, unity, kindness, grace, joy, love. These days—surely they are coming! No we are not there yet, but we are getting closer. I believe we are. I have to believe we are because if I don't then what's the point, right?

There is work still to be done though. More listening needs to be done. More believing of what others are feeling needs to be done too. More empathy and kindness needs to be shared. More vaccines need to get into arms. More consideration of others needs to be emphasized. More laughter needs to be heard. More grace needs to be given. More love needs to be offered. There is work still to be done.

Now I get it, because if you are like me, you're tired, you're done, you're overwhelmed, you're all of it. Which is why we need to not let the absolutely least celebrated Christian holiday and holy day come and go. Not now. Not this time. Because we need to dream dreams. We need to remind ourselves, over and over again, these dreams we dream—the dreams we <u>all</u> are dreaming—to keep dreaming them and keep them in the forefront of our minds and hearts and spirits. We need to stay mindful that God is, through the work of the Holy Spirit, at work to make these dreams become a reality.

So let us not give up. Let us keep going. Let us keep working. Let us keep dreaming. For when we do then we share the Good News of Jesus Christ in ways and languages everyone will understand, and once again lives will be forever changed for the better. Let us dream these dreams.

A Message from the Pastor and Elders Regarding Worship

June 1, 2021

The following information will go into effect For the June 6^{th} Sunday Service.

To The Congregation:

At long last the COVID-19 pandemic is becoming manageable. The CDC has issued new guidelines. Vaccinated people may now resume most activities without masks. Non-vaccinated people should still follow masking and social distancing best practices. While the COVID-19 threat is minimal for those who are vaccinated, the danger for non-vaccinated and immune-compromised people remains. Additionally, vaccines have not been approved for children under 12 years old.

In light of this good news the Elders spent the past week praying, discerning, and discussing how we as a church can move forward while keeping the health and safety of all our members foremost. Our church congregation includes people in all categories: vaccinated, unvaccinated, immune-compromised, and ages 12 and under. And because we do, we must keep this in mind as we make transitions to the new guidelines, for as is written in 1 John 3:21-24, "And this is his commandment, that we should believe in the name of his Son Jesus Christ and love one another, just as he has commanded us. All who obey his commandments abide in him, and he abides in them. And by this we know that he abides in us, by the Spirit that he has given us."

Therefore, with such in mind, here are the elements of our Sundays that will change and what our church expectations will entail because of new CDC COVID-19 guidelines:

- Mask Mandate: Non-vaccinated people should continue to wear masks. Vaccinated people do not have to wear masks but may choose to do so voluntarily.
- Passing of the Peace: People may choose to pass the peace through physical contact.
 Please respect the desires of those who choose not to have any physical contact.
- Singing: We request those who wish to sing do so while masked. Singing has long been recognized as an activity that

increases the danger of spreading COVID-19 over a greater distance.

- Receiving Line: Jonathan will continue to greet folks as they exit the service. If you initiate contact he will gladly receive such. If you prefer to greet him from a social distance, he will gladly accept your greeting as such with a smile.
- Communion and Offering: This will remain unchanged. Individual communion elements are available for pick-up before the service and offering trays are available as you enter and exit the sanctuary.
- Choir, Coffee Hour, and Junior Church: These activities normally go on hiatus during the summer and will do so again this year.
- Nursery: The Nursery will be available. We ask that you call the church office during the preceding week if you plan to have your child in the nursery so we can notify the Nursery staff.

We all deeply appreciate the love, patience, and support you have given throughout this challenging year. We have come a long way, but COVID-19 is not completely over. So we ask for you to keep doing the good and faithful work God is leading us to do as we make our way through this stage of the pandemic. And as always, we welcome your thoughts, questions, and concerns.

Grow Group Summer Reading List

After an academic year of regular meetings the Wednesday Night Grow Group will begin a summer break here in June. But what a year it has been! After hearing from the congregation that it wanted to explore how we could faithfully respond to the struggles and unrest unfolding in our society we brainstormed ideas that came directly from you the congregation. Among them was to take an intentional introspective look at one's self, keep listening, and approach with curiosity, compassion, and empathy.

In an effort to tend to this focus we read and discussed the book: "Anxious To Talk About It: Helping White Christians Talk Faithfully about Racism" by Carolyn B. Helsel. After that study we then read and discussed the book: "Holy Disunity: How What Separates Us Can Save Us" by Presbyterian Pastor, Layton E. Williams. If you have not had a chance to check out either of these books the group highly recommends both!

And if you need some other summer reading suggestions may we add:

"How To Be An Antiracist" by Ibram X. Kendi.

"White Fragility: Why it's so hard for white people to talk about racism" by Robin Diangelo.

"A House Divided: Engaging the issues through the politics of compassion" by Mark Feldmeir.

"The Sum of Us: What racism costs everyone and how we can prosper together" by Heather McGhee.

But if your summer reading list is already maxed out (after all the NPR summer reading list did already come out before this publication) may we suggest some quicker reads by following the blogs of Rev. Tired Of Talking About Privilege? Jonathan Rumburg

A friend of mine recently shared with me a piece from the blog by John Pavlovitz, a writer, pastor, and activist from Wake Forest, North Carolina who has been working and ministering for social justice for over twenty five years. The piece is pointedly titled, "Tired of Talking About White Privledge? Then You Have It." In part, Pavlovitz says,

"If you're tired of talking about privilege right now, that's a fairly good indicator you're terribly afflicted with it—that opting out even feels like an option. If you're sick of the topic of police brutality, it's probably because you've never been on the receiving end of it, never been terrified of those lights and sirens, never watched someone who looks like you be murdered in the street. If you find yourself becoming weary on the topic of systemic racism, that may be an alarm you are benefitting from it so much that your empathy is easily exhausted. If you're tired of talking about pervasive injustice, it is because you have the luxury of being tired of it. Justice has usually favored you." Tired of Talking About Privilege? Then You Have It. (johnpavlovitz.com)

These were just a few of the convicting, truth filled words in this powerfully pointed piece. And while it is my hope and prayer I have not allowed my empathy to become exhausted, I am reminded by these words that I am afforded a privilege not everyone gets to have. And this truth rests heavy on my mind, heart, and spirit. And because it does I want these words to embolden me to stay aware of this truth, and then be open to what I can do to fuel real, positive, and equal change. I want these words to remind me that it is wrong for only a select few to have the privilege and freedom to move, drive,

and shop without the eye of suspicion always upon them. I want these words to keep me mindful that others are not given the same opportunity for advancement. I want these words to change me so that I can continue to be part of systemic change in our community and beyond.

It continues to be my hope and prayer that each of us as individuals, and all of us as a church, strive to work for healing and wholeness in a broken and fragmented world by being the hands and feet and voice of Christ Jesus in all we say and all we do.

<u>Update from the Stewardship Team</u> Financial Giving from the Congregation for January – May 2021

We won't close the financial books for May for a couple more days, but I wanted to provide a status of where we are currently with our congregational giving.

The Total Income budget amount is \$21,181 per month. This includes congregational giving and other income sources like building rental. For the month of May, so far, our income is \$22,131. For the month this is above the budget amount by \$950.

Year to date our income has been \$107,865. This is above the budget for Year to date by \$1,958.

This is good news! If our giving continues to exceed the budget that will help us successfully meet our 'Leap of Faith', where our budgeted expenses are higher than our budgeted income!

As we shared in December, the budget approved by the Governing Board and the congregation for 2021 has the total expenses higher than the total income. We refer to that gap as our Leap of Faith, with the hopeful expectation that throughout the year we will be able to both increase our income and control our expenses appropriately. The 2021 Leap of Faith amount is \$20,046 for the full year.
