Pastor's Pen, August 2021

Pastor Karl Vaters has been in pastoral ministry for over 40 years, and is the teaching pastor of Cornerstone Christian Fellowship, a healthy,



small church in Orange County, California, where he has ministered for over 28 years. He is the author of several books are all geared to helping small churches thrive. Several years ago I had the pleasure of hearing Pastor Vaters speak at a clergy conference and I got to meet him. I have read a couple of his book, followed his blog, and listened to several podcasts in which he was featured. I have found him especially helpful and inspiring over the last several months as we continue to live through, and hopefully out of, this time of global pandemic.

One of Vater's recent blogs was entitled, "Healthy Churches Will Get Stronger—And Four Other Post-COVID Realities." I click on his blogs often, but when I read the words this title you can bet I clicked real fast. And the reason I clicked so fast was because every pastor, especially the small church pastor, wants and needs answers to the thousand questions we are all asking, and well, I was hoping and praying this blog would have them all. It didn't, of course, but I wasn't disappointed because even though there were no simple and easy answers in his blog (because there aren't any) what there was nonetheless was encouragement. And encouragement can be way better than answers.

In this blog post Vaters shares what amounts to five realities churches are facing in this time of global pandemic—the during, after, and what might even be a continuation. His five realities are: *Healthy Churches Will Keep Getting Stronger; Adaptable Churches Will Become Even More Resilient; Majoring On the Minors Won't Just Be A Distraction, It Will Be Deadly; Church Size Is Becoming Less Important; The Next Crisis Will Accelerate And Amplify These Differences.* You can find the full blog post at: <u>Healthy Churches</u> <u>Will Get Stronger – And 4 Other Post-COVID</u> <u>Realities | KarlVaters.com</u>

Long term vision, adaptability, operating with integrity while focusing on the essentials of faith, small churches are coming back on people's radar—these were just a few points within the larger body of work that Vaters was spelling out as the traits, qualities, visions, and blessings healthy and thriving churches are living out. And as I read through them, I began to find, not the answers I was looking for, but the encouragement I was needing because within them all I saw how First Christian Church has been, and is making them happen.

Feeding the hungry and being a broader community presence has been a long term vision of First Christian church, and that vision has only expanded in the last sixteen months. Focusing on the essentials of faith—that we connect with God and one another, that we are present in times of need, that we live and share the Good News of Jesus Christ has been maintained and furthered over these months. Our church is small, but our community knows we are here for them and people are noticing.

All of these points, and more, are coming into a clearer focus and a faithful direction week after week. We have created and hired two new staff positions in just the last few months, each of them setting us up to further our ministries, further our reach within the community, and further our call to share and spread the Good News of Jesus Christ. *THIS!* This is encouraging! And I hope and pray you see it and know it because too often, and far too much, we only hear about the negative happening in and to churches today.

Add in, as Vaters says, "*adaptable churches will become even more resilient.*" Have you seen the adaptability we have pulled off!?!? In one week we went from in-person worship to full on streaming. In the following weeks we had members quickly figure out and navigate how we would stay connected with a broader online presence. We found ways to make upgrades and repairs, do zooms meetings, expand giving methods, worship feel as close to home as possible, and fellowship connections all continue, in new and effective ways. I could go on and on about our adaptability.

But we are not done yet. Not with the pandemic and not with how we will continue to make our church even stronger for the work and ministry God is calling us to do. So as we eek out the last bits of summer, let us begin to prepare our hearts—with the encouragement that can clearly be seen—for all that God is going to be doing in us and through us in the weeks and months to come.

Disciples Church Extension Fund <u>Tech Grant</u>

In the last week of May, Disciples Church Extension Fund (DCEF) offered an opportunity for churches just like First Christian Church of Stow: a matching grant up to \$5,000. The granted funds are to be used for enhancing a church's online presence, whether through live streaming or social media. After crafting an application with input from other churches and their technical staff, First Christian Church of Stow has been approved for a grant!

With this grant, we have an opportunity to improve the quality of our livestream worship services. This will better serve our families (and any other folks who find us online) who worship with us remotely.

To take advantage of this grant, however, we need to raise enough of our own funds for DCEF to "match" our own fundraising. DCEF is willing to provide up to \$4,171 towards our purchase of tech equipment. The amount they provide is dependent on the amount we raise through contributions first. For example:

- **If we raise \$3,000** then DCEF will provide an additional \$3,000.
- **If we raise \$4,000** then DCEF will provide an additional \$4,000.
- If we raise \$5,000 then DCEF will provide an additional \$4,171.

If you feel called to contribute to the online life of our church beyond your initial offerings, please note that part of your contribution as "Tech Grant" and our financial team will include it as part of this effort.

Intro to Mark for August 8th and 15th From Christian, Director of Church <u>Relations:</u>

As Jonathan will be taking another "pause" through the next two weeks, I'm going to be filling in with an abbreviated performance of The Gospel of Mark. This performance was part of my honors thesis project at Malone University regarding new ways of understanding The Gospel of Mark. Here's a bit of an explanation on the topic:

According to new research through the past 15 years, the early church would not have been *reading* any of the books or letters that were sent around to various churches from the Apostles: One literate person would read it aloud for everyone in the church (since 90% to 95% of people were illiterate). This "performance" was animated, lively, and observed in just one night! The performance you'll see is about 30 minutes in total, divided into two parts for the 8th and the 15th. I hope you enjoy seeing and hearing The Word brought to life!

Stow Glen Closure

For nearly four decades Stow Glen has been operated in the City of Stow as an assisted living and skilled nursing facility. During that time dozens of members of our church have called Stow Glen home. So as news broke last week that Stow Glen would be closing it was shocking to hear to say the least. And then to hear residents would have to leave almost immediately was even more shocking. Currently our church has just one member at Stow Glen and alternative housing is being secured, and her move will come after a short stay with family members. There may be a need for help moving this member/resident out of her apartment, and then into her new apartment. When/if the need arises we will let you know.

Let us hold in our prayers all the residents and their families who are impacted by Stow Glen's closure, keeping in mind that the stress and sorrow and having to leave a home where one feels safe and comfortable with caregivers they know is, and will continue to take a toll. Let us pray each of them is able to settle into new care facilities quickly, and that they feel soon the peace, care, and safety God is providing. Let us hold in our prayers the staff whose jobs and livelihood as all been turned upside down, that God's peace may surround them too, and that God leads them to new employment quickly. And let us give thanks to the dozens and dozens of community volunteersmany of them students from Stow Munroe Falls High School and our church's Boy Scout Troop 169 for showing up early on Saturday, July 31st to help in the process of packing up, moving residents, and then helping unpack the rooms of residents all with the thoughtfulness, care, and love as if the people they were helping was their grandmother or grandfather. Truly, when we work together as a community, we are all #StowStrong.

<u>Update from the</u> <u>Finance/Stewardship Team:</u> <u>Financial Giving from the Congregation</u> <u>for January – July 2021</u>

We won't close the financial books for July for a couple more days, but I wanted to provide a status of where we are currently with our congregational giving.

The Total Income budget amount is \$21,181 per month. This includes congregational giving and other income sources like building rental.

For the month of July, so far, our income is \$21,446. For the month this is above the budget amount by \$265.

Year to date our income has been \$152,599. This is above the budget for Year to date by \$4,330 (2.9%).

As we shared in December, the budget approved by the Governing Board and the congregation for 2021 has the total expenses higher than the total income. We refer to that gap as our Leap of Faith, with the hopeful expectation that throughout the year we will be able to both increase our income and control our expenses appropriately.

The 2021 Leap of Faith amount is \$20,046 for the full year, which is 8% above our budget income.

Any increases will help position us to be able to increase the outreach assistance we can provide to our community, both local and globally.
