#### Pastor's Pen October 2022

New voices. Fill the void. New rules to solve new problems. Don't revert to old habits. Make it happen. How do we restart post Covid? Overcome or exhaustion and complacency.

Give us purpose! Become more relevant to our youth. Find what matters to them. What do they find purposeful? More one on one engagement. Fruit salad. Keep experimenting. Try something but if it doesn't work try something else. How can we get people more excited for church ministries? Involvement. Ask face-to-face invitation. Specify individual tasks and time. What ministries are you drawn to? Ingathering. Music. Youth. Women's groups. Cleveland Christian home. Game/movie night. Coffee hour. Chili cook off. Drama ministry. What environment mental concerns I keep you from involvement? Multiple sign ups. Drive time. Fear of open-ended commitment. Covid exposure/risk. Homebound. Sabbatical takeaways: We carried on. Soul-searching.

These were among the notes taken during the three church chats held throughout the summer as a part of the work you the congregation did for your sabbatical time. I really enjoyed reading them, and hearing from some of you about the meanings represented within these notes.

**Don't revert to old habits**—this is certainly a statement a preacher wants to hear from their congregation!

Overcome our exhaustion and complacency—Yes, let's do this! Especially "complacency." That's the worst, isn't it?!

**Keep experimenting**—Another solid Yes! from this preacher. Let's try some new ideas and new ways of being church. Experimenting is not changing for change sakes; it's just trying something new to see if it works.

Sabbatical takeaways: Soul-searching—Exactly what all of us were invited to do during this time. Search our souls for what resonates within us. What is grieving us because God's presence is ignored? What do we have within us that will make a difference?

*Fruit salad*—Umm... so... about this one. I mean, who doesn't love a good fruit salad, but I'm stumped here. No matter. I am sure there is a depth of faithfulness still at work here.

All of these statements and notes are good and faithful. I commend you on the hard work each of you did to go deeper into questions asked of you as individuals and as a church. As I said my first Sunday back, I loved looking at the tree that stood in the Gathering Area all summer long and the post-it-note "leaves" you put on it with responses to other hard

questions, along with prayer requests and focuses. It is apparent the summer of sabbatical work was "fruitful" for you. (Perhaps that's how the "fruit salad" is now getting prepared?!)

Give us purpose! This statement stood out to me as well. Purpose. That's something we all want and need isn't it? A purpose to get up in the morning. A purpose to do what we do each day because we know it means something and makes a difference. And certainly there are layers upon layers to having purpose, whether as a church or as an individual. And certainly we all know the purpose of any faithful church—share and spread the Good News of Jesus Christ. "Go into all the world and proclaim the good news" Mark 16:15. That is certainly among the purpose we have as a church and as followers of Christ. Another is to love God with all our heart, mind, spirit, and strength. And another then purpose is to love our neighbor as ourselves—and who is our neighbor? Everyone of course. These are all purposefull calls and focuses we have. The deeper layer to all of it becomes, of course, the ever elusive question...How? How do we fulfill this purpose purposelessly?

That's a fantastic focus. It is a deeply faithful desire. But, yeah... that's really hard. It's hard because I can't give you that deeper purpose. I can't help guide you to it. I can encourage you to keep moving toward your purpose. I can, and do, pray for your purpose to be not only found, but then carried out and fulfilled. Because that is what is needed. You are needed. The Church needs you, and this church needs you to find your purpose because no one else—only you and God—can give you the life changing and life impacting purpose that is for you.

The work of sabbatical isn't over. In many ways, now that we are all back together, this work begins anew because if we are going to take First Christian Church of Stow to the impactful level God is calling us to have then it will require us all to keep going, to keep moving forward, to keep trying new ways of being church, of being faithful followers who spread and share the Good News. Old habits and complacency will never get this work done. Waiting for someone else to do it will never get this work done. What will get it done will be a willingness to keep moving forward, no matter how hard it might get, and find our place within this movement where God can and will use us and our gifts to make a difference.

It is so good to be back with all of you. My family and I missed our church family, yet we are so grateful for the gift of sabbatical you gave to us. And now we are excited and energized to be back, and to get back to being Church with you all. The church God is calling us to be. May it be so.

#### Sabbatical Summer Wrap Up

Our church was given a great opportunity from our friends at the Lily Foundation—The opportunity to breathe, reflect, and act upon those reflections. We're through the first two parts of this process. Moments of rest and time to relax from the regular school year and its busyness came for us all. Once we were into June, we started with two different ways to share in this reflection opportunity, one through our Post It Note Tree, and through our Church Chats. As we shared together in thoughtful discussions and fellowship, more Fellowship has arisen from these chats, such as the Woman's Fellowship Picnic, held on September 17<sup>th</sup>.

The last part of this process is yet to come: To Act on what we've learned, and to use what we've found. We're already doing this in multiple ways, whether realizing that we want more fellowship opportunities, or that we have missed and been rightfully frustrated as we passed by opportunities to support our local community. We've taken the time to talk about what we care about, and have became more aware of our priorities, and our future.

The work and responsibility of acting on the reflections we have had this summer are not finished this fall, but are upon us for as long as those reflections and times of fellowship speak a ringing truth about who we are as First Christian Church. In 2023, we will continue looking for more ways to provide the Fellowship we sought this year, and take opportunities of community outreach before us.

### **September Hurricanes Strike Week of Compassion Responds**

Severe weather has struck multiple places, battering the east coast of the Americas, while Typhoon Noru made landfall in the Philippines. When severe weather events are happening at greater frequency, aid response efforts like those from Week of Compassion become increasingly important here in America, and around the world. While we're being kept up to speed on our neighbors in Florida, below is more information about other communities in the world, facing similar struggles. Week of Compassion is working with local organizations in all of these regions.

On September 13th, Hurricane Fiona struck Puerto Rico and traveled far past the US to land in Nova Scotia by the 25th, knocking out power for thousands and hitting coastal cities with high waves, storm surges, and damage to homes and businesses. That damage pales in comparison to the deluge that Puerto Rico has experienced since September 13th, around 900,000 people of Puerto Rico are still without power, and 327,000 are without water as of Friday the 30th. Because of lacking resources and infrastructure, the consecutive damage of Hurricane Maria (2017) has not been fully recovered and will compound issues with Fiona.

However, on the opposite hemisphere, Noru made landfall in the capital city of the Philippines on September 25<sup>th</sup>. Being already damaged from last year's Typhoon Rai (a category 5 storm from last December), Manilla faced the fastest leap of peak winds from Noru, as it went from 60 mph to 160 mph winds in just 24 hours, as it transformed into another category 5 storm. After landing, it traveled further north into Vietnam. There have been reports of several deaths and extensive property damage.

Lastly, Hurricane Ian struck Florida mid-afternoon on Wednesday, September 28<sup>th</sup>. Ian made landfall on the central gulf coast as a category 4 hurricane. Storm surges have made it up to 7-10 feet in many areas, and 2.5 million power outages have been reporter.

"Week of Compassion is receiving updates from Regional staff, local church pastors, and ecumenical partners to assess immediate needs and responses. So far, we know of four Disciples churches affected (from minor flooding to severe building and roof damage), as well as numerous Disciples


households. In the coming days, we anticipate many more reports of damage and of Disciples providing care for their neighbors.

Week of Compassion is grateful to do this work on behalf of the church, alongside denominational colleagues at Church Extension and Pension Fund. We join the whole Disciples church, steadily praying for all impacted by this storm, and those yet to come."

It requires us to have compassion and hope for everyone that needs help and redemption in our world. There are many ways for us to step up even when we think we aren't quite ready, and be generous with gifts of time, talents, money, and other resources that God has blessed us with.

On Sunday October 9<sup>th</sup>, we invite you to join us for this stewardship journey. Over the next few weeks, we will share stories that witness to the ministries that God has entrusted to us and show how these ministries can transform lives. These stories of our shared ministries grow out of God's love in Christ and our desire to give back some of the many blessings he has shown to us. When we are good stewards, God is revealed! When we are good stewards, God's kingdom is revealed. When we are good stewards, Jesus is glorified!

On Sunday October 30<sup>th</sup>, we will share our natural and grateful response to the generosity and salvation that God has worked in our lives. On that day we will accept your personal commitment cards during our service.
