<u>January / February 2023</u> <u>Pastor's Pen</u>

What month is it? Still January? New Year's Day was this month, and the Three Wise Men (or maybe the 27 Wise Men?) just visited the little baby Jesus, but yet Valentine's Day is just around the corner with Ash Wednesday on its heels? But if that hasn't been enough to strain the bandwidth of our already overburdened minds, hearts, and spirits, our church family lost a saint far too soon. This is to say nothing of all the other, garden variety, everyday demands that are, well...demanding. Never before have I allowed an issue of the Pathways to be this late in getting out for which I am sorry and I do beg your pardon. 2023 is off to a banner start, isn't it?

Admittedly, I sarcastically thought this recently. We all have moments of quiet despair after all. Thankfully it passed quickly when all of it helped me remember a story I shared just last January in a sermon. All of this moved me to share that story again because maybe for you, like it did for me, it will create a space to enter into and be reminded there is always *more* happening around us than we realize, and so much of the *more* that is happening is the beauty and goodness of God. *******

In Washington DC, at a Metro Station, on a cold January morning, a man with a violin played six Bach pieces for about an hour. During that time, more than 3000 people went through the station, most of them on their way to work. After about four minutes, a middle-aged man noticed the musician playing, slowed his pace and stopped for a few seconds, but then moved on to meet his schedule. About four minutes later, the violinist received his first dollar from a woman who without stopping threw money in the hat and continued on. Six minutes later a young man leaned against a nearby wall and listened...but for less than a minute, then looked at his watch and started to walk again. Minutes later, a boy no older than three years stopped to take in the music and sight of the violinist, but his mother tugged him along hurriedly. The boy stopped to look at the violinist again, but the mother pushed hard and the child continued to walk, turning his head the whole time. This action was repeated by several other children, and so was the same action of every parent repeatedwithout exception-imploring their children to move on quickly.

After forty-five minutes of continuously playing only six people had stopped and listened—each for just a short while. About twenty gave money but continued to walk at their normal pace. The man collected a total of \$32. After one hour the violinist finished the last piece and silence took over. No one noticed, no one applauded, no one asked for an encore. There was no recognition at all.

No one knew this, but the violinist was Joshua Bell, one of the greatest musicians in the world, and he had just played one of the most intricate pieces of music ever written, with a violin worth \$3.5 million dollars. Two days before, Joshua Bell sold-out a theater in Boston where the seats averaged \$100 each to sit and listen to him play the same music.

This is a true story. Joshua Bell, playing incognito in a D.C. Metro Station, was organized by the Washington Post as part of a social experiment about perception, attention, and priorities. This experiment raised several questions: *In a commonplace environment, at an unanticipated hour, do we perceive beauty? If so, do we stop to appreciate it? Do we recognize the extraordinary in an unexpected context?*

One possible conclusion reached from this experiment could be this: If we do not have a moment to stop and listen to one of the best musicians in the world, playing some of the finest music ever written, with one of the most beautiful instruments ever made...*How many other blessings, how many life altering moments, are we missing as we rush through life?"* ******

When we follow, when we let Christ guide us, we discover the beautiful extraordinary, life altering beauty and goodness all around us. We discover again what we have been created for—to embody the presence of Christ that reminds us we have been created for something far greater than we ever let ourselves believe. We have been created for more than the schedules we have to keep or for going as fast as we can. We've been called to be today's manifestation of God's presence in the world. We have been called to show others there is more goodness than madness; there is more splendor than evil; there is more love than hate.

May it be all of our prayers that we don't miss the *more* blessings and the *more* life altering moments all around us each day. Happy New Year everyone...even though it's almost February.



This chart shows the number of individuals who received groceries from our pantry during 2022. This does not include our Christmas Ingathering. As you can see we served a total of 958 people. We spent \$2,369 on food items during 2022, which comes out to \$2.47 per person.




Each person who came to us also received as many meals as they requested. Some people just got meals for themselves, some got meals for their entire family, and some got meals for hungry neighbors. We spend between \$100 and \$150 per month on food for our meals. We can all agree that was money well spent.

An Amazing Ministry

Christmas Ingathering is a truly awesome ministry. This ministry is the collective, cooperative effort of the congregation, the outreach team and our community sponsors. Whether you played a small part, a huge part or any part in between, we needed and continue to need everyone working together to accomplish so much for so many. This year we assisted 42 families with children receiving gifts and provided food assistance to an additional 9 households for a total of 82 adults and 99 children receiving assistance.
