# May 2023 Pastor's Pen

Long time pastor, Rev. James Harnish, of the incredibly successful Hyde Park United Methodist Church in Tampa, Florida, wrote a book that spoke powerfully to me when I first read it, and has crept back into the frontal cortex of my mind on many occasions since. The book is entitled, "You Only Have To Die." It's a rather ominous book title, isn't it? Would it help if I told you it's a book about the church, and how a congregation is to conduct itself? Probably not, huh? But that's how the truth works sometimes, doesn't it? We don't want to hear it. but it's exactly what we need to hear. After all, it was Jesus who said, "Unless a gain of wheat falls into the earth and dies. it remains just a single grain: but if it dies, it bears much fruit."

The past few months (ok, years) have been... arduous, haven't they? I love that word. Even though it often comes off as negative, the word arduous really doesn't have to be as it simply means, "involving or requiring strenuous effort; difficult and tiring." And working from that perspective and meaning we can all think of times when something we were doing required strenuous effort and was difficult and caused us to be asleep before our heads hit the pillow. But a lot of time those "somethings" were worth it! Getting through college and seminary to earn my degrees was "arduous", but worth it. Getting Julie to first go out with me and then marry me was "arduous", but worth it as we just celebrated our fourteenth anniversary.

This has been the case with the last few "arduous" months where a lot has been happening in the life of First Christian Stow. From the season of Lent to Holy Week and Easter, to new visitors and guests, to preparing for Youth Sunday, to creating and organizing a brand new Diaconate, to planning and preparing for our first ever Kid-Parent Prom, to teaching Pastor's Class in preparation for Baptism Sunday. And as we look toward the summer, we know we will need to prepare for our 4<sup>th</sup> of July Pancake Breakfast and Vacation Bible School.

And while these are great happenings in the life of our church, we have not been without some difficult ones. We have had numerous folks from our church family in the hospital and struggling with health issues—all of whom need our ongoing prayers for strength, patience, and healing. Add it, there is the ever-present reminder of our church's budget leap of faith we must keep mindful about. It has been some time since I recall so many "somethings" reaching a climax at the same time.

So how do we continue to press on and move forward when so much requires "*strenuous effort;*" and is "*difficult and tiring*"? Harnish said in his book, "*Hope is born when we are willing to die for the right things.*" He speaks of dying to our old ways of doing church and ministry, of dying to our stifling ways of thinking, but remaining faithful to our God given call of following Jesus. He believes, as I do, there is a massive population of spiritually searching people who still find within the center flow of our faith tradition an understanding of the Christian faith that is the most appropriate framework for a life of hope, peace, joy, and love; no matter how "arduous" the work can seem at times.

What is key for us all to remember, and then act upon, is that when we work together, when we step up to new roles and opportunities, we are making the work and ministry we are called to do easier, more manageable, and better. Yes, in order to achieve such, we may have to "die." We may have to die to our old ways of thinking: "Oh, someone else will do that." "I'm too old." "They wouldn't want me." "We've never done it that way before." and so on. These lines of thinking are dangerous, and lead to a different kind of death.

In these upcoming summer months there are a vast number of ministries that will require *strenuous effort*, they will be *difficult* and *tiring*. They will require parts of us to have to "die" for them to grow to fullness of life. But they are the *"right things"* for our church now, and we can be certain if we do the hard, "arduous" work for these right things, then our work will bear new fruit—it will bear new life.

So may we remember, because of Easter, we only have to die to find new life.

### Being Air-Aware Information from CleanAirResources.com

Have you ever heard of "*particulate pollution*." You might think this has something to do with the length of a Sunday sermon, but it's actually a serious matter for a large number of people and their health.

Particulate Pollution refers to a person's risk for developing health issues resulting from air that has become "polluted" by a wide variety of "particulates" which can come from even common elements and chemicals in our everyday lives, including, but not limited to: perfume, cologne, laundry detergent, and household cleaners. Even healthy individuals can experience problems that result from polluted air. Yet scientists agree certain groups are particularly sensitive to the effects of particulate pollution, and the most susceptible to severe health problems as a result of this type of air pollution include: older adults and the elderly; people who work outdoors; expectant mothers; infants and children under twelve, those who suffer from lung conditions: and more.

What all this means then is that there is a need to broaden our perspective and awareness of what we consider to be *particulate pollution*, knowing it may not even be what we traditionally think of as air pollution. Below is a letter from Laurie Scott, concerning this topic:

\*\*\*\*\*\*

Hi All. Have you been wondering where I have been – not in my usual seat outside the sanctuary for the past several months? I WANTED TO BE THERE but I have not been able to attend because I am HIGHLY allergic to chemical fumes - which includes perfume and cologne. When I am exposed to the fumes (even one breath will cause me to start reacting), my throat, tongue, ears and sinuses start to swell. (I know it's not the USUAL allergic reaction, but it's what happens to me). I can take one pill a day to reduce the swelling but I try to stay away from fumes so that I can take it at night before bed – otherwise it will disrupt my sleep. Another thing this reaction does is it causes me to choke on food if I am not careful. When the tongue swells it will not push food down the throat, which then gets caught behind the tongue

but in front of the throat, blocking off the windpipe.

Would you be willing to refrain from wearing perfume or cologne so I can attend church? It is not a demand; I cannot do that and I wouldn't. But I am asking as a friend if you would please consider this request. (I realize a guest may occasionally come wearing one of the a for mentioned – I will deal with that at the time. (I will not confront anyone; I will probably just leave...) I would still sit outside the sanctuary, as scented lotions will also cause me to react. With those items, the scent doesn't linger in the air after you walk by, so they are not as big a concern to me.

*"Air pollution"* certainly includes combustion engine exhaust and factory smoke we have all heard is harmful to the environment. But *"particulate pollution"* can be even as little perfume yet just as harmful. And while we are all ready to do what we can to help our environment, let us see one opportunity to help our environment by being considerate of what we are putting into the air of our church building. Let us consider how we as a church family can be <u>*"Air Aware"*</u> and help create an accessible, welcoming, and healthy environment for all of God's children every time they come to First Christian Church of Stow.


