Pastor's Pen, August 2023

As the calendar turns to August my family will be celebrating A.J.'s 10th birthday. Hard to believe it has been ten years since that fateful night when he raced—literally—into this world. And just like the obtuse sense of timing he had on the night/morning he was born, he still finds "fun" ways to make declarations of immediacy. For instance, his unbelievable ability to declare his need to use the bathroom immediately after we have passed a rest stop. Fortunately, over this decade of raising my boy I've learned to ask before we pass an upcoming rest stop if anyone needs use of its facilities. And now, every time we go to Pittsburgh, I just plan to pull into a particular half-way point rest stop on Interstate 76 eastbound. And truthfully, I have come to enjoy stopping here—but not just because they have a cool arcade racing game I like to play. PANTRY PAPER PRODUCT PROPOSAL

It has been 2 1/2 years since we added our pantry to our existing Loaves & Fishes outreach ministry. We have all learned quite a bit over those months. One of the main lessons is that our guest are very thankful when we have paper towels and toilet paper available to give away.

These items, of course, do cost money. When we spend money on paper products that's money that could have been spent on food for our guests, taking from Peter to pay Paul. We're all set for August's pantry but we could use some help for September through December.

We give each family one roll of paper towels and one four pack of toilet paper. We are exceeding 45 families each month, so that's roughly 50 rolls and 50 four packs or 200 of each for the rest of 2023.

Here's a challenge for our congregation: can we donate enough rolls of paper towels and four packs of toilet paper to cover our pantry needs for the rest of 2023?

Who Are We and Where Are We Going? Church Chats: Identity & Direction August 20th & 27th, 11:15 a.m. - 12:15 a.m.

"But Moses said to God, "If I come to the Israelites and say to them, 'The God of your ancestors has sent me to you,' and they ask me, 'What is his name?' what shall I say to them?" ¹⁴ God said to Moses, "I am who I am." ^[b] He said further, "Thus you shall say to the Israelites, 'I am has sent me to you.'...

This is <u>my name</u> forever, and this <u>my title</u> for all generations." NRSV, Exodus 3

We know the story—Right? The Israelites have been captured and living in Egypt as slaves for quite some time by now. Moses, in the wilderness, speaks to God, and is told to speak to the Israelites. Moses, suffering from *Pusillanimity* (*lacking courage*), asks, "If they keep asking, 'What is his name?' what do I say?"

In this moment, God gives us one of the most now-identifiable names of the Judean God. Names of God include El-Shaddai, Adonai, Immanuel, King of Kings, Lord of Hosts, Redeemer, El, and many more. Speaking to Moses, God chooses "I am who I am", or sometimes, "I am THAT I am", as if to say, "You already know who it is."

In this moment, Moses is looking to identify God, and communicate the All-Mighty to an enslaved people whose greatgreat grandparents would have worshipped, but have since forgot in the milieu of Pharaohs and the large pantheon of Egyptian gods. God cut through all of that and reminded the Israelites, "I am." It worked, and the Israelites broke free of their oppression, and found their own identity without Egypt.

We, as a church, have a wide variety of ministries and services that we provide to our community. Realistically speaking, after the last three years, we're doing an incredible job for the hand our world has been dealt. It's difficult to summarize everything we do—From our ministries of Loaves & Fishes + Pantry, providing spaces in our church for multiple recovery groups and community organizations, and hosting so many ways to worship through music and other means.

And while our name, First Christian Church of Stow, is one we've had for decades almost two centuries God has led and guided us to become and grow beyond more than just "the first" church in our community. For instance, ask the people fed on a monthly basis at Loaves and Fishes + Pantry who we are to them, and not one of them will say, "This is the first and oldest church in Stow" because that demarcation has little to no bearing on how our church is blessing them. God has blessed us to be more than just "the first" to our community, and we continue to grow beyond that demarcation, and grow closer to God's mission for us.

We will be meeting to celebrate the work that we do, the community we foster, and the impact we have. By celebrating what we do best and what we want to do in the future for our local community, we will prayerfully find a new name and identity that speaks to those two questions: "Who is God calling us to be, and Where is God calling us to go?" Join us after Church on August 20th and 27th at 11:15 a.m. to 12:15 p.m. as we answer those questions in fellowship together.

2024 International Affairs Seminar for Youth - Christian Church in Ohio (Disciples of Christ) Friday, March 8th 2024, 7 p.m. – Saturday, March 16th 2024, 4 p.m.

Formerly known as "United Nations Seminar"

The International Affairs Seminar for Youth (IAS) Challenges youth to learn about international affairs, U.S. Foreign policy, and the Church through study, discussion, and presentations during their time in New York City and Washington, D.C. It seeks to encourage faith-based critical thinking and reflection through prayer, worship, discussion and community building. We are excited to be partnering this impactful experience with the Heartland Conference, United Church of Christ.

The trip is limited to 46 high school sophomores, juniors, and seniors. It will cost \$1,200 per student, which will cover bussing, lodging, most meals, tour fees, 2 theatre plays, and more, including a \$200 for personal use. The trip will depart and return from 1st Christian Church in Wadsworth. If a student you know would be interested, an application form is available at ccinoh.org. There are a number of pre-requisites to going on this trip, outlined in the IAS newsletter in the church office, but they are worth navigating for this very special opportunity!

Loaves & Fishes + Pantry June Report

Well, the June results are in....We set a new record for meals served and groceries provided. We served 49 families consisting of 140 individuals. Sloppy Joes, Chips, Pasta Salad, and Cookies were had by all.

This table shows the growth of our pantry by comparing the first six months of 2021, 2022, and 2023.

^{*}These costs are for the groceries that we give away through the pantry. The meal costs are accounted for separately.

You can see that our costs have increased as the number of people served has increased. Yet our cost per person has stayed remarkably steady.

What a tremendous honor it is to serve the hungry in our neighborhood. We couldn't do this without the time and effort put in by our volunteers, both church members and non-church members. Just as important is the financial support provided by all of you through our church budget.

<u>Update from the Finance/Stewardship Team</u> Financial Giving from the Congregation through June 2023

Hello all! Here is a mid-year update from the Finance/Stewardship team. As you may recall, the Governing Board and the congregation approved the 2023 budget proposed by the Finance/Stewardship with the budgeted Expenses being higher than the budgeted Income. We refer to this difference as our Leap of Faith. We can achieve that Leap of

Faith combining 2 goals; increasing our Income (primarily made up of Individual Giving) and decreasing our Expenses by controlling our spending.

Here is a chart that shows our progress towards meeting our Leap of Faith. It compares our total actual income to our total budgeted expenses, showing how close we have been as we have ended each quarter this year. You can see that through March we were close, but our income has slowed down through the 2^{nd} quarter, so we are now farther away from our goal.

The Total Income budget amount is \$21,664 per month. This includes congregational giving



and other income sources like building rental.

The Total Expense **budget** amount is \$24,305 per month.

The Leap of Faith amount is the difference between our budgeted Expenses and our budgeted Income. For the full year that amount is \$24.687, and monthly the amount is \$2,057.

If you prefer to think of this as a percentage, our actual income needs to be 9% higher than our budgeted income to meet out Leap of Faith.

If you personally are feeling financially stable and would like to make an additional gift to the church above your normal giving, those are always appreciated. Any increases will help position us to be able to meet our Leap of Faith, and to sustain the outreach assistance we can provide to our community, both locally and globally.

Please let any member of the Finance/Stewardship team know if you would like to see our full reports, we are happy to share them.
