Chapel Ceiling Update from John McCreight

Look inside for some good news about our Chapel Ceiling! We're on a long journey, but we're in good hands by the grace of God.

Pastor's Pen, September 2023

As members of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in the United States and Canada, we confess Jesus is the Christ, the son of the Living God, and proclaim him Lord and Savior of the world. In Christ's name and by his grace we accept our mission of witness and service to all people. A key principle of the identity of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in the United States and Canada is that we are a movement for wholeness in a fragmented world. As part of the one body of Christ, we welcome all to the Lord's table as God has welcomed us.

This. This right here, is who we are.

And in 2013 the General Assembly of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in the United States and Canada called upon the Christian Church "to recognize itself as striving to become a people of grace and welcome to all God's children though differing in race, gender, age, sexual orientation, gender identity, nationality, ethnicity, marital status, physical or mental ability, political stance or theological perspective" and "to affirm the faith, baptism and spiritual gifts of all Christians regardless of their sexual orientation or gender identity, and that neither is grounds for exclusion from fellowship or service within the church, but we celebrate that all are part of God's good creation"

This. This is also who we are.

So when a new resolution came before the 2023 General Assembly in Louisville, Kentucky last month, many wondered if who we say we are would be lived out. I am profoundly proud and deeply moved to say we have lived out who we are.

It is resolution *GA-2352: Invitation to oppose* anti-trans legislation and affirm the dignity of transgender and gender-diverse people. And when this resolution came up for a vote to be adopted and brought into the fold of who we are as Disciples and how we live out our call as Disciples; or to not be adopted, we Disciples made a resounding statement...with absolute silence.

General Assemblies are a lot of fun. Seeing old friends and colleagues. Picking up swag at all the booths of colleges, seminaries, and ministry organizations. Spectacular worship services with incredible music and song and dynamic preaching. But General Assemblies can also be a tiny bit tedious, particularly when it comes to business sessions. However, they can be joyful, fun, and even touching at times. For instance, the General Assembly re-elected Rev. Teri Hord-Owens to a

second term as General Minister and President. Rev. Hord-Owens is the first African American and second woman to lead the denomination—and the first African American woman to lead a mainline Christian denomination. So, yeah, that was a pretty spectacular moment for sure. There are, still though, times when General Assemblies can get a little tense. And that was what many anticipated when GA-2352 was brought to the Assembly floor. But, ye us of little faith would soon see we were wrong to anticipate such.

The resolution stated, in part, "Therefore be it resolved that the General Assembly of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in the United States and Canada meeting in Louisville, Kentucky July 29th-August 1st, 2023, reaffirms the historic commitment of this movement to recognize and affirm the sacred dignity of all peoples as all are made in the sacred image of God and deserving of respect and honor; and be it further resolved that the General Assembly encourages all expressions of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in the United States and Canada to uplift religious texts and stand in solidarity with transgender and gender diverse individuals against harm being done against them often with the misuse of religious texts and symbols.

This resolution, if adopted, would mean the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) would further its stance and belief that all people are God's holy and beloved children, and all deserve to be treated with dignity and love, and it is absolutely wrong to bring harm to any child of God, be it through legislation, misusing God's holy word and/or holy symbols of faith, or in any way.

Now, to be clear, the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) spans the broad spectrum of politics and ideologies. Meaning we don't all agree on everything. Some Disciples are very conservative, and some are very liberal. And everyone else falls somewhere in between. Especially on "hot button" topic resolutions. That is except when it came to GA-2352.

When it was time for discussion, many Disciples lined up at the microphones designated for voices of support. Not a single Disciple went to the microphones designated for opposition. And when it was time for the vote, all in favor were invited to say "I", and Disciples raised their voices. Then, all opposed to GA-2352 were invited to say, "Nah." And this is when the Louisville Convention Center, filled with over three thousand Disciples fell

absolutely silent. Not a single "nah" vote was cast. GA-2352 was passed and adopted...unanimously.

When the gavel was struck, I saw numerous Disciples burst into tears of joy, because once again we Disciples said "This is who we are."

We are a diverse denomination. Not all believe the same. We disagree on many points, especially "hot button" topics. That too is who we are. But what we all agree on is that all people, no matter what, no matter who they are, no matter how they identify themselves, no matter the pronouns they prefer—all people are holy and beloved children of God, and all holy and beloved children of God deserve dignity and love because that is what Jesus taught and showed and died for.

Love God. This is who we are. Love your neighbor. This is who we are. And because this is who we are, we are Disciples of Christ.

The International Affairs Seminar for Youth (IAS) Challenges youth to learn about international affairs, U.S. Foreign policy, and the Church through study, discussion, and presentations during their time in New York City and Washington, D.C. It seeks to encourage faith-based critical thinking and reflection through prayer, worship, discussion and community building. We are excited to be partnering this impactful experience with the Heartland Conference, United Church of Christ.

The trip is limited to 46 high school sophomores, juniors, and seniors. It will cost \$1,200 per student, which will cover bussing, lodging, most meals, tour fees, 2 theatre plays, and more, including a \$200 for personal use. The trip will depart and return from 1st Christian Church in Wadsworth. If a student you know would be interested, an application form is available at ccinoh.org. There are a number of pre-requisites to going on this trip, outlined in the IAS newsletter in the church office, but they are worth navigating for this very special opportunity!

<u>Update from the Finance/Stewardship Team</u> <u>Financial Giving from the Congregation</u> <u>Through August 2023</u>

Hello all! Here is a new update from the Finance/Stewardship team.

As you may recall, the Governing Board and the congregation approved the 2023 budget proposed by the Finance/Stewardship with the budgeted Expenses being higher than the budgeted Income. We refer to this difference as our Leap of Faith. We can achieve that Leap of Faith combining 2 goals; increasing our Income (primarily made up of Individual Giving) and decreasing our Expenses by controlling our spending.

Here are 2 views that show our progress towards meeting our Leap of Faith. These compare our total actual income to our total budgeted expenses, showing how close we are now at the end of August, comparing that to end of July.

The Total Income **budget** amount is \$21,664 per month. This includes congregational giving and other income sources like building rental.

The Total Expense **budget** amount is \$24,305 per month.

The **Leap of Faith** amount is the difference between our budgeted Expenses and our budgeted Income.

For the full year that amount is \$24.687, and monthly the amount is \$2,057.

If you prefer to think of this as a percentage, our actual income needs to be 9% higher than our budgeted income to meet our Leap of Faith, and thru the end of August our income is 7% lower than our budgeted income.

If you personally are feeling financially stable and would like to make an additional gift to the church above your normal giving, those are always appreciated. Any increases will help position us to be able to meet our Leap of Faith, and to sustain the outreach assistance we can provide to our community, both locally and globally.

Please let any member of the Finance/Stewardship team know if you would like to see our full reports, we are happy to share them.

<u>Chapel Ceiling Update—</u> From John McCreight, Chair of Trustees

On June 21st, we found that the Chapel Ceiling had collapsed! The roof is fine, but the ceiling literally dropped in the area where the pews are located. The Chancel area & the back room appear to have only been affected by the dust & insulation from the fall.

Since then, Al Naylor has been working with our insurance company to see if they would cover this damage, and a few weeks ago they determined they would! This was after they had a structural engineer check it out to determine why it failed. Thanks, Al, for staying with them on this.

Joe Ott got our electric turned off in the damaged area for safety and has been working with Stow Building Department to make sure we have the proper permits, etc. needed for the cleanup. Joe also directed us to a contractor we expect to engage soon to begin the clean-up work. We expect the same contractor will be doing the "rebuild" part as well. Thanks Joe!

We are still asking everyone to stay out of the chapel. One reason is that it is not safe, parts of the ceiling are still hanging. If it were to drop further & people were in there, that would not be good. Another reason is that the floor is still covered with insulation and dirt. We don't need that tracked around the church.

We did get Asbestos testing done as quickly as we could once the event occurred. There was no asbestos found in any of the debris area/substances. So that is a good thing.

Going forward we will be working with our contractor, our insurance company/adjustor, and the City of Stow Building Department as we restore the Chapel.

There are still things we aren't sure about yet. We will try to keep the congregation informed as we reach milestones or get other significant updates.

We continue to Thanks God there was no one in there when this happened & that we have other spaces in the church we can use as we continue to worship Him.

Thanks also to Mike Deiwert for his input on how to proceed. And thanks to everyone for your prayers regarding this unexpected event.
