Pastor's Pen: March 2024

I know I have said Lent is my favorite time of the year to the point that I probably sound like a broken record each time this season rolls around on the liturgical calendar. Lent is a time of self-examination, repentance, self-denial, conversion, and growth. It is a time of intentional introspection that can help us grow in our faith and deepen our relationship with God. But in addition to that, it is a time to be honest and truthful with ourselves and with God so that together we can become an even better version of ourselves. How can you not get excited about the idea and possibility of such becoming a reality!?

Put the season of Lent into this kind of perspective and yes it certainly does become something to get excited about. Who wouldn't want to become a better version of ourselves, right? But maybe some of you are saying, "But Ash Wednesday was weeks ago. We are already halfway through Lent. I missed the boat and I'm too late to jump on board." To that line of thinking I would ask you, "Do you really think God keeps a calendar? Do you think God doesn't except late work?"

It's true, Lent lasts for forty days, excluding Sundays, and begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on the Saturday before Easter. In the early church candidates for baptism had to undergo an intense time of preparation (as long as two years) for the baptism service that was held once a year on Easter Sunday. The preparation was a time of study, prayer, fasting, and self-examination. Eventually the whole Church joined in this time of preparation for Easter—a time of celebrating Christ's risen life.

Over time Lent became connected to the 40 days of wilderness preparation experience of Jesus (Mathew 4:1-11, Luke 4:1-13) and to the events of what became known as Holy Week—the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus. Worship spaces are often decorated in purple which is the color of Lent. The word "Lent"

itself has come to mean springtime or new life and many congregations invite their people into a season of spiritual spring cleaning. Many people implement a practice of "giving something up" for Lent, a practice that when done with integrity, fosters a stronger will, one that intentionally chooses to make room for God amidst all the competing realities of life. Giving something up for Lent is a choice to say no to lesser desires so that we can say a greater yes to God. But "giving up something" isn't for everyone, and so folks will "take something up" for Lent. Perhaps taking up volunteering, or working through a particular book of the Bible, or writing daily prayers.

Regardless of the practice, what is key to using the season of Lent to help ourselves draw closer to God and become a better version of ourselves, is to be intentional within the practice. To take time to immerse ourselves in the season and say to God, "Here I am. Guide me. And I will follow you." A willing and contrite heart is all that is needed for an intentional and faithful season.

At its heart Lent is a journey into wholeness, a participation in God's mission of redemption. The journey of Lent for believers follows the journey of Christ to the cross, the tomb, and resurrection. It is a corporate practice that joins believers to Christ's way of humility and dependence on God. In many ways, Lent is an invitation to a form of dying and rising. And because it is, it doesn't matter if you started this journey on Ash Wednesday, or if you start right now. When practiced well, Lent nurtures a greater knowledge and love of Christ and a more realistic understanding of believer's frailties, finitude and need of help from God. And days and dates on a calendar can never keep these blessings of God from us if we are intent on receiving them. Blessings on the rest of, or the beginning of your Lenten journey. I look forward to us all arriving at the tomb, together, on Easter Sunday.

TAKING OUR OUTREACH TO THE NEXT LEVEL Mission Trip with First Christian Church of Stow

On these trips, folks find a deeper understanding of just how devastating an impact a disaster can have. You get to do hands-on work to help those impacted by devastating disasters.

On these trips, folks get to directly serve and help families whose lives have been tragically impacted. Then, you become a part of their comeback story. On these trips, folks often go home tired, but with hearts and spirits ready to move mountains because they knew God used them to change lives in rare and special ways. Ordinary people get to clear away rubble and build up lives after disaster strikes. This is the work of Disaster Relief with Week of Compassion.

First Christian Church is planning a mission trip with Week of Compassion and partner disaster relief organizations for a week in mid-June! (If you cannot commit to a full week, partial weeks have been taken in the past.)

A likely destination is Pike County in eastern Kentucky, where residents continue to work towards recovery from the 2022 July Floods. Work could include clean-up and/or rebuilding projects, or support for teams on those tasks.

Maundy Thursday Agape Service Thursday, March 28th, 6 p.m.

Maundy Thursday is among the most holy and sacred of nights of the year here at First Christian Stow, and we aim for it to be just such a night once again this year.

We will gather for worship on this holy night in Disciples Hall where the space will once again be transformed into that sacred upper room where Jesus gathered with his Disciples on the night he was betrayed and arrested. There we join with our Savior and share with him a meal intended to fill us up spiritually more than physically because this meal, like the one Jesus shared with his Disciples, leads to a profound and moving time of worship where the dim setting, impactful music, moving and touching prayers, holy scripture, and living words of institution take on a deeper and more powerful meaning than any other night of the year.

Please plan to make this time of worship part of your Holy Week remembrances and celebration. A light dinner will be served at 6 p.m., followed by worship around 6:35, with an aim to conclude by 7:20 p.m. The Chancel Choir will rehearse after this time of worship.

Good Friday Time of Worship Friday, March 29th, Noon

This time of scripture, meditation, and silence will take us through the passion narratives found in the Gospels while guiding us in considering and remembering again the sacrifice Jesus made so we would have eternal and everlasting life. You are invited and encouraged to make this part of your Holy Week experience by joining us in our church sanctuary at noon for Stations of the Cross liturgy and scripture, which will be accompanied by intermittent times of silent meditation.

Holy Saturday Prayer Vigil Saturday March 30th, 8 a.m. to 6 p.m.

The Apostle Paul calls for us to "pray without ceasing", however he didn't mean we should be on our knees, kneeling before a cross or communion table, hour after hour, day after day. Rather Paul calls for us to be open to God's presence which is with us at all times. Paul wants us to know a prayerful life is what should be leading us in our daily lives.

As we seek to focus on our Holy Week walk, from the triumphal entry into Jerusalem, to the confusion and fear of Maundy Thursday, to the agony of Good Friday, may we aim to take a part of Holy Saturday to intentionally be in prayer for the new life made possible through the life, death, and coming resurrection of our Savior Jesus.

To do this we invite you to be part of this annual prayer vigil on Saturday, March 30th. This prayer vigil will be held from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m., in the sanctuary at the church. However, you are welcome to be part of this time of prayer in any location of your choosing—your home, a park, a quite spot, or maybe even the front steps of our Chapel where you can let the sounds of the busy road and the people passing by guide your prayers for our community and the world around us.

There is no need to sign-up and no need to pledge a length of time. Come and pray whenever you can and complete your time of prayer whenever you are so moved to be done. It won't be difficult to consider what matters to lift in prayer, but some themes and focuses to pray about could include: Essentials for our members and community; healing for those in need; peace for those feeling restless; hope for those feeling hopeless; comfort for those feeling alone; gratefulness for God's constant and abiding presence, food for those who go hungry; healing for the broken; guidance for the lost; wisdom for our leaders; compassion from those in power.

Let us join our hearts and minds and spirits together, no matter where we might be on this Holy Saturday and go to God in prayer.

On February 18 we held our monthly Loaves & Fishes + Pantry. We had a big month serving around 140 dinners (we lost count!) to our guests. We also distributed groceries to 46 families. By comparison, in February 2023 we served 36 families. Our growth continues.

Dinner was meatloaf, mashed potatoes, and green beans. The groceries included cereal, oatmeal, soups, vegetables, spaghetti with sauce, bread, Entenmann's', fruit cocktail, mac & cheese, laundry detergent, and the always popular toilet paper and paper towels.

Our volunteers, ranging in age from 6 to---well, a lot older than that---had a great time cooking,

packing food, packing dinners, shooting the breeze, sharing stories and lots of laughter.

Of course, none of this could be possible without the support of you, the members of our church who give us the spiritual and financial support needed to pull off an outreach like this. We know the people who went to sleep that Sunday night with full bellies and a full larder are thankful.

- Copy the message and <u>forward it</u> to 7726 (SPAM). This helps your wireless provider spot and block similar messages in the future.
- Report it on the messaging app you use. Look for the option to report junk or spam.

- You can report iMessages that look like spam or junk from the Messages app. If you get an iMessage from someone who's not saved in your Contacts, you'll see a Report Junk link under the message.


