#### Pastor's Pen, May 2025

First they came for the socialists, and I did not speak out—because I was not a socialist. Then they came for the trade unionists, and I did not speak out—because I was not a trade unionist. Then they came for the Jews, and I did not speak out—because I was not a Jew. Then they came for me—and there was no one left to speak for me. ~ Rev. Martin Niemöller

My guess is that many of us have seen and heard this quote before, in some form or another. Above is the original, however today, the quote has been edited and rewritten to include a litany of other people, such as Protestants, Catholics, people of color and different races and cultures, those who are disabled and those of various sexual orientations. This quote, and others like it, are ubiquitous in public discourse and popular culture. One notable place Niemöller's original quote can be found is prominently emblazoned inside Washington D.C.'s Holocaust Museum.

The essence of this quote speaks to the heart of its author, but you might be surprised to know where his heart was long before he penned these powerful words. So, permit me to share a bit of the story of this prominent German pastor.

Martin Niemöller was born the son of a Lutheran pastor in the German Empire on January 14, 1892. At age 21 he started his career in the Imperial German Navy as an officer. During World War I (1914– 1918), Niemöller served as an officer on a U-boat submarine where he successfully helped sink Allied ships, earning the high honor of *Iron Cross First Class*.

Niemöller was a fervent nationalist and anticommunist. He was devastated by Germany's defeat in World War I and the collapse of the German Empire. He also strongly opposed the new postwar German government called the Weimar Republic (1918–1933). Unwilling to serve the new government, Niemöller resigned from the Navy in 1919.

In 1920, Niemöller began seminary training at the University of Münster. Like his father, he was ordained as a Lutheran pastor in 1924. During the 1920s and early 1930s, he participated in right-wing and antisemitic political parties and organizations. And in keeping with his right-wing, antisemitic outlook, Niemöller enthusiastically welcomed the Nazi regime in 1933. He voted for the Nazi Party in March of that year.

Niemöller's enthusiasm for the new government, led by Adolf Hitler quickly waned, however, when the Nazi regime began to interfere in church policy. In 1933 Hitler threw his support behind a radical faction within the Protestant churches known as the *Deutsche Christen* (the German Christians). The German Christians portrayed Jesus as an Aryan and denied he was Jewish. They rejected the authority of the Old Testament and sought to alter parts of the New Testament. Their goal was to remove what they called *"Jewish elements"* from Christianity. This included prohibiting pastors with Jewish ancestry from serving in the Protestant church. This resulted in Niemöller leading the opposition to the *Deutsche Christen* and Hitler's church policy.

Niemöller's attitude toward the Nazi regime further transformed in January 1934 after a meeting with Adolf Hitler. Niemöller, and other prominent Protestant church leaders, met Hitler to discuss the relationship between church and state. At this meeting, it became clear that the Gestapo had tapped Niemöller's phone. The *Pfarrernotbund* (Pastors Emergency League), which Niemöller had helped found in 1933, was also under close state surveillance. Hitler's hostility made it clear to Niemöller that the Protestant Church and the Nazi state could not be reconciled unless Protestants were willing to compromise their faith. Niemöller was not willing to do this.

After World War II, Niemöller openly spoke about his own early complicity in Nazism and his eventual change of heart. His powerful words about guilt and responsibility still resonate today. Niemöller is remembered as one of the more prominent Germans to publicly acknowledge his moral failures committed during the Nazi era, as well as the moral failures of his nation and church. And he continued to speak publicly about the relationship between inaction and Germans' responsibility for the persecution and murder of Jews in the Holocaust.

Niemöller's message declared that through silence, indifference, and inaction, Germans had been complicit in the Nazi imprisonment, persecution, and murder of millions of people. He felt it was particularly egregious that he and other German Protestant church leaders, whom he believed had positions of moral authority, chose to remain silent.

Martin Niemöller shows us that our hearts can be deeply rooted in core beliefs and values, and yet our hearts can be changed when we open our hearts, along with opening our ears, our eyes, and our minds, by challenging ourselves to consider if our core beliefs and values are in line with the teachings of Jesus.

May we all challenge ourselves, continuously, to consider if our core beliefs and values are in line with the teachings of Jesus. And when we believe they are, may we never, ever, choose to remain silent.

#### <u>Chapel Reopening, Rededication and</u> <u>Celebration</u> Sunday, June 1<sup>st</sup>, 10:00 a.m.

Friends, after nearly two full years, it is a blessing and joy to share with you that the "little white chapel" of First Christian Church of Stow, is complete and ready for reopening, rededication, and a celebration worthy of this long journey to being able to worship once again in this holy and sacred space!

And that reopening, rededication, and celebration will all happen on Sunday, June 1<sup>st</sup>, during our 10 o'clock worship. This special and unique worship service will begin just like any other summer Sunday of worship, in the Sanctuary. This time of worship will, however, end over in the Chapel.

This special and unique worship service, and yes, obtuse worship service, will likely draw more people that the Chapel can accommodate, which is why we are structuring the service in this manner. #### <u>Week of Compassion Mission Trip</u> <u>Return to Mayfield, KY</u> June 22<sup>nd</sup> – 28<sup>th</sup>

We are returning during the end of June to Mayfield, Kentucky, to continue the work of restoring housing to the community. There's still much work to be done, despite the events inciting recovery missions starting in 2019. Flooding and tornados have continued to hit Mayfield through 2021, 2023, and 2024, stunting recovery efforts, as more and more need has been created in the community.

Charlie Redman will be our team leader again this year. The registration deadline for the mission is June 8<sup>th</sup>. We will be staying in the New Lease on Life Bunk House, and work for this year's mission trip will be closer to that location than last year.

There is schedule flexibility for those who can't stay the entire time, whether coming late or leaving early in the week. Additionally, there is work available for most, if not all levels of ability, skill, and energy. Whether sweeping and cleaning, or working a table saw, there's something for every hand on deck. Youth are also invited, as long as they're over the age of 16 or older with a parent or guardian.

As with last time, the nearest city center is Paducah, KY, with many historic and cultural landmarks to enjoy during the nights after work. The National Quilt Museum, Paducah's Historic Riverfront, and much more to see (Including the only "Metropolis" in America right across the river!).
